
Current State and Issues of Professional Social Work Education in the Asia Pacific Region

It is necessary for social workers to have competence and respond to issues in their respective fields. Under these circumstances, there is a need for joint collaboration and cooperation in the Asia Pacific Region. This can be achieved by exchanges in research and education based on mutual understanding of unique social contexts.

We aim to capture the current characteristics of the Region as a whole and to mutually learn from in each specific context.


